#### **Book Review**


The Ship Asunder – A Maritime History of Britain in Eleven Vessels, by Tom Nancollas, is a fascinating and enjoyable book describing Britain's amazing maritime history. He looks at eleven items connected to boats and ships. Wood, iron, rope, propellers, steam engines, trumpets, bells, figureheads and masts are just some of the items. In the final chapter, Tom looks at anchors and raises the question, have we 'swallowed the anchor' and lost sight of our heritage? With the advent of cheap flights, most Brits have lost touch with boats and ships as a way of travelling and thus our connections to the seas and oceans. Charles II started sailing for fun and Tom visits Scarborough Yacht Club to see that a passion for sailing, boats and the sea is still alive today. Tom poses a final thought that with climate change and the need for low carbon transport, might nautical travel once again come to the fore?

#### **New donations**

The rusty ship's nails and iron rods, below left, were found in Cornelian Bay and are most likely from an 18<sup>th</sup> or 19<sup>th</sup> century wooden ship. The nails are about 7 inches long and the rods about 18 inches long. If anyone has any more information about them please contact us?
